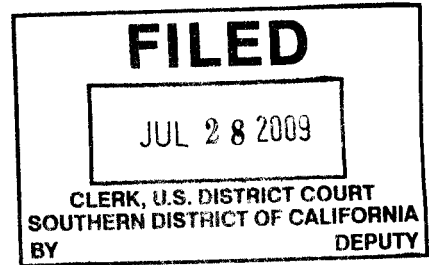

I N F O R M A T I O N

The United States Attorney charges:

1. At all times material to this Information:

a. The Treasury Enforcement Communications System (TECS) is a computer information system managed by the United States Department of Homeland Security. TECS is a repository for data from many separate agency sources which assists law enforcement officers in the performance of their official duties.

b. Defendant JOHN PAUL YANEZ-CAMACHO was employed as a Customs and Border Protection Officer within the United States Department of Homeland Security, an agency within the Executive Branch of the United States Government.

c. Customs and Border Protection Officers are law enforcement officers and, as such, are authorized to access the TECS database as necessary to perform their official duties.

1 Law enforcement officers are not authorized to access the TECS
2 database for personal reasons or for any other reason other than in
3 connection with the performance of their official duties. Each law
4 enforcement officer who accesses the TECS database has a unique
5 password, such that his or her use of the database may be tracked and
6 monitored.

7 2. Beginning in or about January 2005, and continuing up to and
8 including November 2006, in the Southern District of California,
9 defendant JOHN PAUL YANEZ-CAMACHO did knowingly and intentionally
10 exceed authorized access to the TECS computer database and did thereby
11 obtain information from a department or agency of the United States,
12 that is, defendant JOHN PAUL YANEZ-CAMACHO accessed confidential
13 information from TECS on multiple occasions for purposes of checking
14 on the status of himself, his family members and drug traffickers who
15 defendant JOHN PAUL YANEZ-CAMACHO knew from his previous employment
16 at Tequila Frogs restaurant in Juarez, Mexico; in violation of
17 Title 18, United States Code, Sections 1030(a)(2)(B) and (c)(2)(A).
